

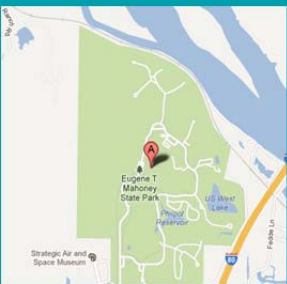

Join your Heartland colleagues at our annual conference **April 11-12th**. This year's theme is "Building Bridges" and will focus on how we can help learners to build bridges from the skills they come in with to the skills they need to have in order to be successful students.

The conference will be held in the Peter Kiewit Lodge at Eugene T. Mahoney State Park in Ashland, Nebraska. The park nestles on 700 acres along the picturesque Platte River. Nearby attractions include the Strategic Air and Space Museum, Lee G. Simmons Conservation Park and Wildlife Safari, Quarry Oaks Gold Club, and Iron Horse Golf Club.

Leadership Positions

Two positions need to be filled at the spring conference. This year you are asked to consider taking on the responsibility for president-elect or treasurer. Both positions are important to the organization and provide experience in working for our organization. The duties as listed in the by-laws are:

The President-Elect

- serves as Site/Program Chair for the spring conference of the Chapter;
- chairs the Executive Committee, Board of Directors, and general membership meetings in the absence of the President;

- attends the Leadership Workshop at the CRLA conference; and assists the President in administration of Chapter business

The Treasurer

- pays all bills approved by the Chapter and substantiated by receipts;
- keeps accurate financial records for Chapter funds;
- provides detailed financial reports at each general membership meeting; and
- prepares books for audit each fiscal year (January 1 thru December 31).

Once again the CRLA planners and on-site folks put on a great conference! The last time CRLA shared a conference with CASP—the annual October conference of the Texas chapters of CRLA and NADE—was in 2006. This 2012 shared conference was even bigger, with the theme of Exploring New Angles on Student Learning & Diversity. (The beautiful downtown hotel inspired the “new angles” theme, with wedge-shaped guest rooms.) I’d like to share with other Heartlanders some of the key events for me. Dr. Victor B. Sáenz (U. of Texas at Austin) keynoted at the First General Session on November 8 with “The Disappearing Men of Color in Higher Education.” His grant-funded [Project MALES](#) tracks Latino and African American men in Texas higher education. Dr. Sáenz shared demographics that made a strong case for all of us around the country to support the academic success of this critical population. Another important event at the First General Session was the induction of two new CLADEA Fellows. The current Fellows of the Council of Learning Assistance and Developmental Education Associations (<http://www.cladea.net/>, of which CRLA is a member), chose Rosemary Karr and Sandra McGuire to join them as honored Fellows, for their scholarship and service to the field. Russ Hodges, chair of the Council, emceed the moving induction ceremony. President Norm Stahl’s address on Friday morning was an eloquent call for CRLA and its members to contribute to a body of research in the

field, increase opportunities to earn terminal degrees in reading and learning assistance, and critically review the reports published by entities outside our field. To better accomplish this last purpose, we should all read a book by Daniel T. Willingham, *When Can You Trust the Experts: How to Tell Good Science From Bad in Education* (2012, [Jossey-Bass](#)). CRLA should also undertake its own critical assessments of our field to provide important information to policy makers on such practices as accelerated programming, integration of reading and writing instruction, modular courses, formal adjunct courses, peer-assisted learning, bridge programs, and SI. Our models have been usurped by others, and we have not disseminated to the higher education community our own assessments. We also need to contribute gold-standard research (which requires random assignment to groups and meticulous statistical analysis) to journals outside our field and issue white papers on critical issues. I’m not even halfway through the conference but have overrun my word limit, so let me end by saying this: The annual CRLA conference is so important to my continuing professional education, even though I’m now retired and have no institutional funding, that I will attend the 2013 conference, November 6-9, in downtown Boston.

Then, at the conclusion of the tutoring session, ask learners their level of confidence again on the same scale and notice the increase. Tutoring does make a difference!

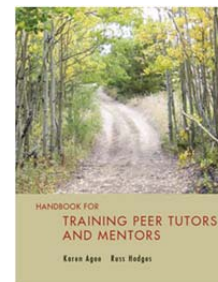
